Please Support the FSW Photo Competition and win £100!! – For 6 years from 2010 we held an annual photo competition. All photographs taken in the wood in the previous year were eligible and from those submitted we drew up a shortlist of around 40-50. These were exhibited at our September Open Day event and the public invited to vote for their favourite. However, sadly, we were unable to hold the competition last year as there were not enough entries to form a reasonable shortlist. We thus decided to make it a biennial event in the hope that enough photographs could be gathered over a two-year period. We are disappointed to report that we still have had very few entries. There are probably enough photographs taken by our active committee members to make a display for judging but it would be far preferable to be able to draw from a wider pool.

Please look back over photographs you have taken over the past two years. You may submit up to 6 photographs taken in Selsdon Woods between 20th August 2015 and 19th August 2017. Winners will be chosen by a secret ballot of the visitors to the FSW Open Day on 10th September 2017 and will be awarded cash prizes: **£100 for the winner, £40 for second place and £20 for third** (all prizes funded by an anonymous donation).
