**Cutting of Grass and Paths** - I should like to give all credit and many thanks to the contractors, Quadron, who have recently cut the woodland paths in Selsdon Wood. They have been cut very sympathetically yet thoroughly including clearance around all the benches. Moreover, this has been done at exactly the right time of year when the wildflowers and butterflies have finished leaving everything tidy for winter and ready for next spring.

You will also have seen that the grass in the fields has now been cut and a number of people have asked me who cuts the hay and what happens to it. That work was also very impressive this year with everything cut, tossed, baled up and gathered all over the space of a week before the rains came. Quadron are also responsible for this work which they subcontract to a local farmer Ian Bushell. After baling the hay is wrapped in plastic and in about six weeks goes to a beef farmer near Guildford.

**Plans for Winter Work** – The work on the Linden Glade pond is now complete and we await the winter rains to fill it. Our workdays team hope to start the autumn/winter season with work in the Gorses area to clear some of the growth of bramble and Sycamore saplings. We will also be addressing some of the worst puddles throughout the wood by digging drainage ditches and filling the holes with gravel. Many thanks to our local councilor, Sara Bashford, for agreeing to fund this from her Community Ward Budget. Work by the council contractor, Coombe Forestry, will be a continuation of the coppice in the Wend and also the widening of Leafy Grove and the Wend. Both these rides will be opened up by scalloping rather than linear cutting with a maximum width of 15m. Main trees to be felled have already been marked with a blue dot.

Stains red when scratched</p>
<p><b>Flat Oysterling</b></p>  <p>Seen in Middle Gorse on a well-rotted stump.</p>	<p><b>Dryad's Saddle</b></p>  <p>Seen in its usual location in Steven's Walk. This fungus recurs annually.</p>	<p><b>Artist's Bracket</b></p>  <p>A sturdy bracket fungus. Seen in Vale Border.</p>	<p><b>Bay Bolette</b></p>  <p>Seen in Middle Gorse.</p>	<p><b>Dog's Vomit Slime Mould</b></p>  <p>Seen near the junction of Noakes Way and Leafy Grove.</p>
<p><b>Stinkhorn</b></p>  <p>In Noakes Way. We have watched the development of this over the past 3 weeks.</p>	<p><b>Birch Polypore</b></p>  <p>A common, bracket fungus growing on Birch. The underside is white and has pores not gills.</p>	<p><b>Birch Woodwart</b></p>  <p>Seen in Langford's Way.</p>	<p><b>Turkeytail</b></p>  <p>A small, widespread fungus with banded colours like the tail of a turkey. Grows on logs and stumps.</p>	<p><b>Dead Moll's Fingers</b></p>  <p>Seen in Greenhill Way.</p>
