Most children took their finds home in little bags we provided and were proud of their efforts. 
### **The 2016/17 Photo Competition**

Our spotters' guide this month shows some fungi you might hope to see on the day.

<p><b>Fungi in Selsdon Wood</b></p> <p>Look out for these on our walk on 8<sup>th</sup> October</p> <p>See the FSW website for further information and lots more fungi.</p> <p>All these species have been seen in Selsdon Wood this autumn.</p>	<p><b>Yellow Stagshorn</b></p>  <p>Regularly seen on a Pine stump in West Gorse and another in The Wend.</p>	<p><b>Amethyst Deceiver</b></p>  <p>Seen in David's Path. Loses its colour quickly - hence "Deceiver".</p>	<p><b>Jelly Ear</b></p>  <p>Grows on old, dead or dying Elder trees. Also called Jew's Ear - see FSW website for explanation.</p>	<p><b>Dead Moll's Fingers</b></p>  <p>Seen in Greenhill Way.</p>
<p><b>Candlesnuff</b></p>  <p>A small fungus that looks like the snuffed wicks of candles. Common on mossy stumps.</p>	<p><b>Sycamore Tar Spot</b></p>  <p>Spots on Sycamore and Maple leaves. Does not damage the tree but causes early leaf fall.</p>	<p><b>Turkeytail</b></p>  <p>A small, widespread fungus with banded colours like the tail of a turkey. Grows on logs and stumps</p>	<p><b>Green Elfcup</b></p>  <p>A fungus which leads to green staining on oak logs.</p>	<p><b>Birch Polypore</b></p>  <p>A common, bracket fungus growing on Birch. The underside is white and has pores not gills.</p>
<p><b>Ivory Coral</b></p>  <p>Seen in our wood for the first time this year.</p>	<p><b>Common Tar Crust</b></p>  <p>Seen off Broad Walk.</p>	<p><b>Powdery Oak Mildew</b></p>  <p>A widespread fungus on Oak leaves.</p>	<p><b>Frosty Bonnet</b></p>  <p>One of the smallest of the Mycenae fungi.</p>	<p><b>Blushing Bracket</b></p>  <p>On Birch logs. Stains red when scratched</p>
