
FSW Photographic Competition 2011

Linden Glade

For as long as I have visited Selsdon Wood, I have known the glade, where the pond used to be, as 'The Bird Pool'. But since Croydon Council cut off the water supply due to vandalism and cost and the pond base was cracked, the pond has ceased to exist. The Friends decided that we should seek a new name for the future that could be identified with an existing feature of the glade. The path 'Pool Grove' will remain as a memorial to things past - as Station Road, Baker Street and Mill Lane are. The two main contenders were 'Memorial Glade' and 'Linden Glade'.

'Memorial Glade' was a good choice because the memorial to Colonel H. S. Wood is clearly there but this name is a little solemn. When the Friends recently cleared up the site they discovered that there were six Small-leaved limes planted about 30 years ago in an arc behind the bird bath. Small-leaved lime trees were a major part of the ancient Wild Wood and were coppiced up to the Middle Ages to provide timber for building, furniture, carving, firewood and rope-making. Monks kept their hives beneath the trees for the rich pale honey produced. The flowers were used to produce herbal medicines and tea. In more modern times the wood has been used for guitars and wind instruments. When explorers brought back hemp for rope-making the tree fell into decline, being replaced by the more productive hazel which abounds in our Wood today. One of our Small-leaved limes has been pollarded in a gale and the resulting long stems must be typical of what was used for rope making.

It is a pity that our six Small-leaved limes did not appear naturally but they represent the trees that were almost certainly felled to extinction in our wood. They will provide a point of historical

interest to visitors in the future. I guess I will always automatically think of the area as The Bird Pool but to future generations it will be Linden Glade.

We will manage the glade for butterflies. The existing bramble patches will be extended to provide more nectar. The nettle patch will be encouraged to grow wider for the caterpillars of Red-admiral, Peacock, Comma etc. Common dog-violets will be planted for Silver-washed fritillary caterpillars and other nectar producing plants will be encouraged. The Fragrant Small-leaved lime flowers will feed insects.

Finally, we must not forget the birds and smaller animals – please keep the bird-bath topped up. Only you can do that.

The Month Ahead

Autumn is a period of changes. Among the birds, the summer visitors have mostly left, though a few, like Blackcaps, may stay throughout the winter. However, migrants leaving other countries pass through the U.K. and almost anything can turn up unexpectedly. Around this time Great Grey Shrikes are on the move and have been recorded in Selsdon Wood. Hawfinches, too, can wander from their breeding areas and might be found in the topmost branches of trees or at ground level as they split Hawthorn or Hornbeam seeds. Woodcock, though more likely to be seen in numbers near the coast, can occasionally be flushed from the undergrowth on an early morning walk. Then there are the species that intend to spend the winter with us - Redwing, Fieldfare, Siskin, Brambling. By keeping your eyes and ears open you may be surprised at what you might find.

It is also a good time to look for fungi. Apart from those emerging from the soil there are many others that grow on tree stumps and dead wood. Look for the thin white strands with black bases of the Candlesnuff Fungus or the multicoloured small brackets of the Turkeytail. Even with the help of a good field guide do not expect to identify all fungi at a glance - some need more detailed analysis.
