Work Session – Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> June – While one of our volunteers weeded, planted, and watered the Butterfly Bank the remainder of the group were involved in clearance activities around seats and carvings. One of the seats along Vale Border was prepared for the fitting of a plaque by a family wishing to remember a loved one who used to sit there.

When the Grow Wild group visited on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> of June, they did further clearance around the Owls carving and cut back some of the branches around the entrance which were obscuring the view of motorist leaving the car park.

**Flowers Walk – Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> June** – Under the leadership of Malcolm Jennings 14 people set off along Vale Border. We crossed field 2 to pass through the trees to field 3 and continued to reach the far side where we turned up to the top of the field, turning back towards the car park. A brief stop was made at the Butterfly Bank to admire the planting. **Butterfly Bank** – Our volunteer has been very active on the Butterfly bank again this month, planting, weeding and watering. A total of 29 different species of plant have flowered so far this year. Fifteen of these have been new plantings, including Salad Burnet, Horseshoe Vetch, Greater Celandine and Harebell.

We have created an illustrated guide to all the flowers on the Butterfly Bank that can be accessed via a QR code displayed on the surrounding fence. This shows all the flowers in separate colour groups with brief notes and photographs to compare for identification. We hope you enjoy using it. Some examples are shown overleaf.

## Flowers Growing on the Butterfly Bank Some examples from the Identification Guide accessed on site by a QR code

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Bird's foot Trefoil	Viper's Bugloss	Hoary Plantain	Lady's Bedstraw	Clustered Bellflower
Its flowers look like little slippers. It is valuable for butterflies because it flowers early from late spring right into autumn.	Pink buds are borne in summer opening to a vivid blue. It provides food for a range of insects, including Large Skipper and Painted Lady butterflies, Honeybees and Red Mason bees.	The broadly elliptical leaves of this species spread horizontally from the crown of the root and lie so close to the ground as to destroy all vegetation below. The spike of downy flowers is vanilla scented.	An important food source for the caterpillars of the Broad-bordered Bee Hawk Moth. It was used in Victorian times as a mattress filler as it had a pleasant smell and repelled fleas	Forms an extensive clump of erect stems bearing dark green ovate leaves and dense clusters of deep violet-blue bell-shaped flowers.
Rock Rose	Wild Thyme	Mouse-ear Hawkweed	Yarrow	Wild Basil
Rock rose flowers are short lived. New flowers open every morning and die at nightfall.	This thyme has a strong scent similar to oregano. It forms a low- growing mat covered with purple pink flowers loved by bees.	Attracts a variety of insects. It has been used in herbal medicine to treat respiratory infections.	Pink or white flowers. It is valuable for pollinators as it continues to flower right through to November or even later.	Pinkish purple flowers in late summer. It has culinary uses and is also used in herbal medicine. It is great for bees and butterflies.
