Can you help? - Nature has put on her greatest spurt and everything in the woods is growing fast. This means new species of flowers coming into bloom almost every day (see the Home page of the website for our May Flowers gallery) but also lots of brambles, nettles etc shooting up around the paths and benches. It would be very helpful if those of you who walk regularly in the wood could take a pair of secateurs with you to trim back the intrusive growth to make the wood better for everyone who uses it. The FSW does some of this on our workdays but every little helps and your support would be very welcome.

There is little natural water in the wood and so the old birdbath in Linden Glade is an important drinking place for many birds and other animals. There has been plenty of rain in the last month which has kept the water topped up but when the weather is dry do please pop in there and add a little water from your bottle to help the wildlife.

Last Month's Walk - 'Bluebells & Birds' with the FSW on 2nd May - Over 45 people attended this walk, which was led by Ted Forsyth. The main objective was to look at the bluebells and we were not disappointed. Following some unseasonably hot weather, the recent rain had brought the flowers out in an amazing display with some wonderful carpets of blue in the wood. Several bird songs were identified near the beginning of the walk but later the wood seemed almost silent and few birds were heard. When we reached Langford's Way we pointed out the territory of the white squirrel and mentioned we had not seen it for some time. Inevitably one of the party, Ian Frost, then pointed high up in the trees where he could see the animal perched on a branch. Ian had a powerful camera with him and took some amazing pictures - see right. We spent a good few minutes until most people felt they had seen the squirrel (and many had photographed it) then we moved on to Stevens Walk where we saw the recently found Three Veined Sandwort and a vast number of the tiny Lilac Ivy-leaved Speedwell. Further on we examined the Dryad's Saddle fungi re-appearing on the same tree stump where they have been seen for three or four years. Outside the Centenary Plantation were Ground Ivy and Germander Speedwell and in the plantation was a single specimen of White Helleborine orchid. We were back at the car park after almost exactly two hours.
