FSW 2014 Open Day - Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> September - We had a lovely day for our annual fair, which was a fruitful money raiser. **Haymaking and Tree Felling in Our Wood** - Those of you who visit the wood regularly will have noticed that the fields have now had their annual cut. The work was done by a local farmer called Ian Bushell who is subcontracted by Quadron - the contractor that does all the footpath flailing in the woods. As part of the contract, Mr Bushell bales the hay and sells it for silage to offset his costs. The hay quality is not good enough for fodder - partly because of the copious Yellow Rattle which is parasitic on the grass. However, the up-side to this is that the weakened grass allows more wildflowers to grow so it is good from a biodiversity point of view. Take a look at the Management page of the website for a photo story about the bailing of the hay which was carried out in a single day in September.

You may also have noticed that the trees cut down this spring in the area at the top of Langford's Way have now all been cleared away. You will find them in the log store at the Farleigh Road end of Vincent Avenue, which is now very well stocked. This wood was cut by Council contractors and will be sold by the Council on the open market to subsidise the costs of work. The purpose of the felling, carried out as part of the 5 year development plan, is to sustain a healthy wood with some understorey and to provide succession. This prevents it all becoming high forest and helps to encourage more varied plant growth and bird life.

FSW Logs and Charcoal - We still have available some of the charcoal we made back in May and logs from the timber felled in coppicing. We will be delighted to let you have bags of charcoal (3 kilos) now for a discounted donation of £5 each, large bags of charcoal finings (a garden fertiliser) for £5 each and sacks of logs for £4 each. When new has a strong smell to attract flies. Found on the ground in The Wend.

Fly Agaric

This is the typical fairy story toadstool. Look for them on the ground in the Gorses area.



Grow on logs and stumps of Beech or Birch. Hard and spherical, it looks like burnt cakes.



A large, bracket fungus growing on Birch. The underside is white and has pores not gills.



Widespread, growing on dead wood. A destructive parasite that kills trees.



A massive fungus high in a tree beside Bluebell Grove - by the crater close to David's Crook.

Sycamore Tar Spot



Spots on Sycamore and Maple leaves. Does not damage the tree but causes early leaf fall.



Small, jelly-like fungus growing on felled logs or stumps.





Small, common fungus growing on the round. The spores are released in a puff when it is touched.



Jelly Ear

A tiny fungus that grows on Bramble stems.



A small, widespread fungus with banded colours like the tail of a turkey. Grows on logs and stumps.



A small fungus that looks like the snuffed wicks of candles. Common on mossy stumps.

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
