FSW Open Day September 1st

For once the weather for Open Day was fair, so we looked forward to a successful event. The pitches had all been marked out in advance and a band of Friends and other supporters turned up early in the morning to help get everything set up for a noon start.

The Friends had four gazebos: one showing what the Friends do in the wood, recruiting membership and making logs available for a donation of £4; a second with displays and activities for children; a third selling tombola tickets, white elephants and books; and a fourth (shared with the Selsdon Residents Association) housing the annual Photo Competition and sales of 2014 FSW Calendars. All were kept busy throughout the four hours with over 150 visitors and we welcomed 14 new members and raised just over £200 for our work.

The additional invited stalls covered a wide range of interests and goods – supporting badgers, birds and bees, and selling wood craft and pottery items. Refreshments were provided by the local scouts and there were guided walks for all ages and activities for children including a scavenger hunt, face painting and story time.



The FSW annual Photographic Competition Senior winner was 'Tawny Owl' by David Malins and the Junior winner was 'Fairy Mushrooms' by Finlay Le Voi (aged 11). These are shown along with all the other shortlisted photographs on the Photo Competition page of the FSW website.

This year there were 21 entrants who submitted over 90 photographs. From those, a shortlist of 50 were selected and printed for display on Open Day when the public were invited to participate in a secret ballot to select the winners in each category. Over 100 visitors voted and the winners of the Junior and Senior competitions were each offered a voucher, kindly donated by our sponsor, Snappy Snaps of Croydon. Our competition has been held each year since 2010.

Nature Notes

This is probably the best time to look for fungi. Many fall into the category of “cap and stem” - like a supermarket mushroom, and occupy a variety of places in woodland. Our prize winning photo is of a type of bonnet fungus. They can be found in groups on fallen branches and trees, but some are solitary and may be found peeping out from the vegetation on the ground, or even amongst grass some distance from trees. Colour of the cap can vary from the garish scarlet with white dots of the Fly Agaric, the favourite of illustrators of fairy tales, through the yellow of Sulphur Tuft, to the varied subtle shades of many other species. While there are hundreds of cap and stem types, there are many other shapes adopted by fungi. Earthballs are spherical and grow on the ground, earth tongues are flattened stems which poke out of the soil, jellies of various colours are blobs of material found on twigs, oysterlings are whitish-pink fungi like a stemless cap attached to dead bramble stems, jelly ears are floppy fungi usually on Elders. There are woodwarts and corals, stagshorns and crusts, brains and brackets. The bracket fungi are usually long-lasting and can be found at any time of the year on standing and fallen timber. Before trying to identify a fungus check the species of tree on which it grows or which is growing nearby - some fungi are associated with particular tree species. Buying an identification book or borrowing one from the library will be of great assistance. Thirty-three species of the fungi found in our wood are shown on the Flora page of our website. If you spot any different ones do please let us have a photograph to add to our collection.

Our avian winter visitors should be coming into the country. Some seem to sidle in almost unnoticed but on occasion species like redwings and fieldfares fly over in enormous flocks. The redwing's call is often heard in the winter woodland – a high-pitched “seep” – while the fieldfare utters a distinctive chuckling call most evident when a flock is in flight. Siskins and redpolls will feed in the woods while there is sufficient food but may enter gardens as the supply dwindles. Bramblings prefer beechmast and may be present in numbers in a year when there is a good crop but otherwise they are elusive birds. Hawfinch is occasionally found in the wood, usually splitting open the kernels of hawthorn and hornbeam seeds. Though greenfinch, chaffinch and goldfinch are native species their numbers can be swelled by an influx from the continent. During autumn and winter they are frequently found in flocks, feeding on weed seeds, on the ground or in trees. [Ted Forsyth](#)

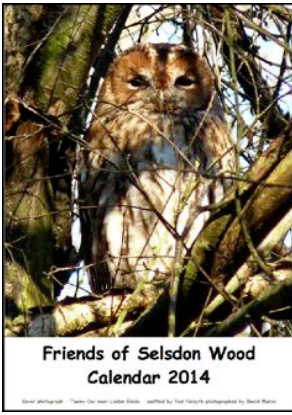

Ted's report of the last workday activity on Sunday 29th September gives the flavour of a typical winter session.

I was pleasantly surprised when the volunteer numbers built up to 13 for the first workday of the autumn. While the trolley of tools was being dragged to the coppice area I took a few people to see the Yellow Stagshorn fungus which had returned to the same tree stump in West Gorse where it has appeared in previous years. At the coppice area we had to select a new fire site - a well-lit glade seemed suitable so we set about widening it with the help of Cyril's chainsaw. Once the fire was lit we were kept busy throwing on the material Cyril had cut, but retaining anything which could be used later for tree stakes, charcoal, etc. More material was cut and burned, then a third cut was left for us to deal with next time. While most of us were involved in that activity a smaller group were cutting with hand tools and using the material to strengthen a dead hedge. As predicted, we did find several fungi including a small Fly Agaric and something which was either Toothed Crust or Split Porecrust, and a number of other species.
